Donor Spotlight

Ambassadors Borden & Sara Wallace

Borden and Sara Wallace became members of Woodlands Conservancy in 2009 and have been increasingly more involved ever since. Borden's and Sara's close connection with nature put them in a position to eloquently share their view of the value of Woodlands Conservancy's efforts to preserve the bottomland hardwood forested acreage for wildlife and recreation.

Borden sought the support of Daybrook Fisheries to fund the Daybrook Pavilion at Woodlands Trail to expand the use of the site as an outdoor classroom to encourage environmental stewardship in current and future generations. The Wallaces opened their home to Woodlands Conservancy to host the first Legacy Party that was organized to invite their friends to con-



tribute to the Woodlands Conservancy Endowment Fund at the Greater New Orleans Foundation to ensure the maintenance and growth of Woodlands Conservancy's conservation and education efforts.

Shell Funds Restoration & Volunteer Efforts



During a press conference and celebration of the acquisition of Delacroix Preserve, Ed Landgraf and Josh Eskind of Shell graciously presented Woodlands Conservancy with a check for \$35,000. The grant funded Ecosystem Restoration Work to remove non-native, invasive vegetation from Woodlands Trail and volunteer efforts to engage community members and interest groups in caring for the properties managed by Woodlands Conservancy. **Entergy Funds Site Improvements**



A \$33,000 grant from the Entergy Foundation was received to fund site improvements at Delacroix Preserve and community outreach efforts. The funds allowed the installation of a culvert, creation of a parking area and improvements to the trail leading to the bird research station. The community outreach efforts funded marketing throughout the Greater New Orleans area that served to raise the visibility of Woodlands' efforts and engage more community visitors and volunteers.

24 hour event raises friends and funds

GiveNOLA Day is an annual fundraising effort initiated and hosted by the Greater New Orleans Foundation in 2014. The inaugural event was held on May 6, 2014. The 24-hour fundraising effort is an online giving event to inspire people to give generously to the nonprofit organizations that make the Greater New Orleans region a stronger and thriving community for all.

Delacroix Preserve Placed on Natural Areas Registry

Sairah Javed, a Biologist with Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Natural Heritage Program, came to Woodlands Conservancy's Delacroix Preserve to present the organization with a plaque recognizing the dedication of the "Delacroix Preserve Natural Area." Dan Dreiling, Board President of Woodlands Conservancy, welcomed visitors to the special occasion at Delacroix Preserve to "formally recognize Woodlands Conservancy's efforts to care for and enhance this unique forest that provides a rich habitat for wildlife and migratory birds and protects the community by serving as a natural sponge and wind buffer during storms."

To qualify for the Registry a property must contain at least one of the following natural values: habitat for native plants or animals with rare or declining populations in Louisiana;

plant communities characteristic of the native vegetation of Louisiana; or outstanding natural features such as old growth forests or wetlands. Javed noted that "Delacroix Preserve is being recognized on the Natural Areas Registry as it includes all three of these special characteristics."

Cummins Mid-South Volunteer Event

Employees of Cummins Mid-South selected Woodlands Conservancy's Delacroix Preserve as the site for their 2014 employee community volunteer effort. Thanks to the coordination of Calvin Klotz, Mike Aufdermauer, and Dana Morvant of Cummins Mid-South and Lee Dupont of Woodlands Conservancy and the efforts of Cummins Mid-South employees, Delacroix Preserve has a pavilion for use during research and education events.

Planning for the future and sustainability

Wetlands Research & Education Center Strategic Master Plan



During a twelve month period spanning the latter part of 2013 and the first half of 2014, the Woodlands Conservancy Planning Committee worked with Mossop & Michaels Architecture Firm. The Delacroix Preserve Strategic Master Plan for the Wetlands Education & Research Center was completed in October 2014 and details the elements and phased costs of contruction. The Delacroix site is currently the focus of ongoing resident and migratory bird research and ongoing systematic, data-based ecosystem restoration activities to enhance this dwindling habitat for wildlife and migratory birds.

Freeport Boathouse site of Legacy Party

Completely surrounded by nature, the Lakefront was the perfect setting for a Legacy Party to friend and fund raise for the long term sustainability of Woodlands Conservancy. The event, was organized by then President of the Board of Directors, Dan Dreiling, pictured at near left. Bird Observatory takes flight

BTNEP Provides Start-up Funds for Bird Observatory

Barataria-Terrebonne National Estuary Program (BTNEP) provided funds for Woodlands Conservancy to conduct important research on resident and migratory birds beginning in 2014. Working in collaboration with Baton Rouge Audubon Society, Woodlands Conservancy joined the effort of the Louisiana Bird Observatory to better the understanding of birds and their populations. In addition to contributing to state-wide analysis of bird behavior in Louisiana, data collected during monthly banding sessions at both Woodlands Trail and Delacroix Preserve will help evaluate differences in bird behavior in healthy forested wetlands compared to those in restored areas and those in unrestored areas.

Federally permitted, trained Banders utilize mist nets to capture resident and migratory birds at both Woodlands Trail and Delacroix Preserve on a monthly basis. The bird is outfitted with a numbered leg band and a variety of measurements are taken before the bird is released. The data is uploaded to a regional and national data base and provides valuable information including:

- migratory routes and behavior
- wintering and breeding areas
- physical health of populations
- causes of mortality

The Woodlands Conservancy Bird Observatory is obtaining data to assess bird characteristics and use of healthy forested areas, restored forested areas and areas containing non-native vegetation in order to guide management decisions in this vital dwindling habitat.

In the first 12 months of operation, Woodlands Conservancy has banded 438 birds representing 37 species including: Acadian Flycatcher, American Robin, Black-and-White Warbler, Blue-Gray Gnatcatcher, Blue-Headed Vireo, Carolina Chickadee, Carolina Wren, Common Grackle, Common Yellowthroat, Downy Woodpecker, Eastern Phoebe, Gray Catbird, Hermit Thrush, Hooded Warbler, House Wren, Indigo Bunting, Kentucky Warbler, Mrytle Warbler, Northern Cardinal, Northern Waterthrush, Orangecrowned Warbler, Oven Bird, Painted Bunting, Pine Warbler, Prothonotary Warbler, Red-Eyed Vireo, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Swainson's Thrush, Swamp Sparrow, Tennessee Warbler, Tufted Titmouse, White-eyed Vireo, White-throated Sparrow, Worm-eating Warbler, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, and Yellow-billed cuckoo. Seventy-eight birds have been recaptured thus beginning to show evidence of birds that are breeding at the Woodlands sites.

Service Learning in outdoor classroom

Brown Foundation Funds Service Learning Project



Students at Belle Chasse Primary fill cells with soil in which they will plant their germinated seeds. A contribution from the Joe W. and Dorothy Dorsett Brown Foundation Service Learning Program has made a joint project between Belle Chasse Primary School and Woodlands Conservancy possible. Students in Mrs. Newchurch's 4th grade class partnered with Woodlands Conservancy during the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 school years to work on the "Seeds to Saplings" project. Woodlands Trail serves as their Outdoor Classroom to learn skills in Citizenship and Science through hands-on activities.

The "Seeds to Saplings" project focuses on learning about the local watershed, the value of forested wetlands and what a student can do as a citizen in their local community to contribute to the increasing health of their watershed. Students learn to identify, gather and germinate native seeds. They monitor the growth of their seedlings and finally plant the seedlings in restoration areas to improve the habitat for wildlife and migratory birds and increase the storm protection value of the forest to the community. Students participating in the project showed increased scores on the Science LEAP Test.

Supplemental support for the "Seeds to Saplings" project was provided by Shell during the 2013-2014 school year and by Chevron Oronite for the 2014-2015 school year.





Students Study Forest Characteristics



Edna Karr High School students spent the day at Woodlands Trail learning about the characteristics of a bottomland hardwood forest. Students identified trees and understory vegetation and conducted water quality testing experiments comparing the characteristics found in spring water to water found in canals and wetland areas at Woodlands Trail.

Service Learning Partnership Enters 8th Year

The Spring of 2014 marked the eighth year of an ever-expanding partnership with Dr. Sean Anderson, California State University Channel Islands' Pacific Institute of Restoration Ecology, and Dr. John Lambinos, Oregon State University Horticulture Department. Researchers split their time between Woodlands Trail and Delacroix Preserve, working with their twenty students to collect annual data of stem density and frequency of native and non-native vegetation in permanent research plots.


The permanent research plots were initiated in 2006 following Hurricane Katrina's removal of over 80% of the forest canopy that created open areas in which non-native invasive vegetation proliferated. The data collected helps Woodlands Conservancy plan activities to remove non-native vegetation and determine what native species to plant to help enhance the habitat for wildlife and migratory birds.

In 2014, vegetation samples were collected and taken to the Tulane Herbarium to validate identification for inclusion in planned professional journal articles.

The graph pictured to the right shows the denisty of Chinese Tallow over the past six years. Removal efforts occurred between the 2009 and 2010 assessment and again between the 2010 and 2011 assessment.

Funding for Ecosystem Restoration

In June 2013, Woodlands Conservancy entered into a 25 year agreement with the United States Fish & Wildlife Service's Partners for Fish & Wildlife program to conduct ecosystem restoration activities to enhance the Delacroix Preserve's habitat for wildlife and migratory birds. During the first year of the agreement, Woodlands Conservancy received a grant of \$39,900 from USFWS to remove non-native, invasive vegetation from the 190 acre Delacroix Preserve and institute management practices to address decreasing the feral hog population.

NEEF Funds Events at Woodlands Trail




