## Where the Wild Things Are: The Woodlands Conservancy Wild Wine Dinner



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Home to one of the region's last bottomland hardwood forests, the role of the **Woodlands Conservancy** is multi-faceted. Comprised of the 609-acre Woodlands Trail in Belle Chasse and the 190-acre Delacroix Plantation in Lower Coast Algiers, it is the home to more than 35 native wildlife species and a habitat for 163 species of resident and migratory birds. It has hiking and equestrian trails, and offers interactive educational programs.

On Saturday (Nov. 14), **Woodlands Conservancy Wild Wine Dinner** was held a so this unique forest area, as well as the conservancy's programs, can be preserved. It was the benefit's third year: the first one featured Trinchero Family Estates wine at Dominique's on Magazine; the second, focusing on Dakota Shy Wine, was held at English Turn Golf and Country Club, where it returned to this year.

At this 2015 soirée, wines were provided by **Republic National Distributing Company**, with fine wine specialist **Peter Patti** discussing each of the wine and champagne choices to the crowd. The wines served during the Patron Party were: **Ferrari Carano Chardonnay, Sonoma**, **2013; Landmark Vineyards Overlook Chardonnay, Sonoma**, **2012; Faust Cabernet Sauvignon, Napa Valley, 2013; Justin Cabernet Sauvignon, Paso Robles, 2012; Joseph Phelps Cabernet Sauvignon, Napa Valley, 2012; and Darioush Cabernet Sauvignon, Napa** 

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Valley, 2012. Champagnes included: G.H. Mumm Brut Cordon Rouge, which was served at the cocktail party portion of the evening, where Kenwood Vineyards Pinot Noir, Russian River Valley, Sonoma, 2013; and Graffigna Centenario Pinot Grigio, Estate Bottled Reserve, Argentina, 2014, were poured.

While guests sampled the wines, they could also peruse the silent auction, which offered wines, restaurant gift certificates, art, **Zurich Classic of New Orleans** passes, hotel stays, and tickets to performances at the **Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra** and **Le Petit Théâtre du Vieux Carré**. Throughout the event, partygoers could also purchase jewelry from **Mignon Faget's Palmetto collection**, which was designed for the conservancy, with a portion of proceeds benefiting it.

English Turn chef **Larry Thibodeaux** created the cuisine for the evening, from hors d'oeuvres to a three-course meal: roasted pumpkin salad; pork tournedos, grits and grillades or Masa fried speckled trout; finishing with a turtle molten cake. Wines served with dinner were **Stags Leap Wine Cellars Hands of Time Red Wine, Napa Valley, 2012** and **Chateau Ste Michelle Indian Wells Chardonnay, Columbia Valley, 2014.**
