## Lafayette Students Clears Woodland Trails

With four GPS Trimble units on loan from Navigation Electronics in Lafayette, the students, accompanied by members of the Louisiana Hiking Club, were able to mark and clear over a mile of trails within the area dedicated for Woodlands Trail-America's Wetland Birding Trail.

With University of Louisiana at Lafayette students leading the way with GPS units, the Louisiana Hiking Club and area volunteers were able to clear fallen trees from the pathway in an effort to assess the condition of the WWII ammunition magazines. The group of more than 30 volunteers were successful in clearing the pathway to one of 10 WWII magazines.

Excited about the future of Woodlands Trail and with a sense of ownership, both the ULL students and Louisiana Hiking Club have committed to returning in March to assist in clearing before spring growth makes the effort even more challenging.

Woodlands Trail and Park members are anxious to move forward as they are faced with losing funding in June 2006 that was awarded three years ago for trail construction. They have not been able to moved forward with trail construction due to waiting for final permitting that was not acquired until August, 2005.
