USACE Seeks Public Comment on Neptune Pass Flow Control Structure

The United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) is looking for public comments on a proposed "flow con-trol feature within Neptune Pass, a newly enlarged pass on the east bank of the Mississippi River across from Bu-ras in Plaquemines Parish." The comment period officially began on September 16 and will last for 30 days until October 16.

Neptune Pass is a naturally created major channel that leads from the Mississippi River to Quarantine Bay. It has developed into a pass that is 90 feet deep and 850 feet wide at certain points. Environmental advocates state (as they usually do when discussing diversions from the Mississippi River into the marsh) that the pass is necessary for the development of marsh in that area. As such, it should not be interfered with.

USACE is proposing to build a structure in Neptune Pass that allows for a 100-feet wide, 10-feet deep open-ing. The corps believes this is necessary because if this pass is allowed to flow freely, it will continue to slow down the river and cause sediment to continue to build up in the shipping channel.

Considering the fact that the mouth of the Mississip-

pi River was recently dredged to a depth of 50 feet and that two separate ports are pursuing the development of an international container terminal that would service increasingly larger cargo vessels, there may be value in

ensuring the river remains at a proper depth.
